Northumbria Police - Knife Crime Information

Following on from the *Knife Crime* workshops Year 9 received last week, please see further information and guidance below from Northumbria Police for parents and carers.





The facts, the law, and how to make a report

Knife crime devastates the lives of victims and their families and brings misery and fear to our communities. We need to work together to ensure that everyone understands that carrying a knife can easily end in tragedy.

Individuals who carry a knife often say they do so out of fear and to protect themselves. We want people to know those who carry a knife or an offensive weapon are putting themselves at greater risk of being seriously injured or killed themselves.

70% of young people attending A&E with stab wounds are injured by their own weapon/knife.

What does the law say?

Can I be stopped and searched?

Yes. A police officer can stop and search any person, or vehicle, where they have reasonable grounds to suspect they will find prohibited items, including offensive weapons such as knives.

What are the consequences?

If you are found in possession of a knife (a pointed/bladed article), you could face a range of punishments, including up to 4 years in prison.

Making a report

What should I do if I think or know someone is carrying a knife?

- If you believe there is an immediate threat to life or if you have just seen someone carrying a knife, dial 999
 and report it to the police.
- Advise your child that, if they suspect anyone of carrying a knife or an offensive weapon, they should tell a
 trusted adult. This could be a police officer, teacher, parent or guardian. When it isn't an emergency, police
 can be contacted on 101 or a report can be made online.

If it isn't an emergency and you don't want to contact the police:

Crimestoppers

This is an anonymous reporting service for anyone to give information relating to a crime. There is a phone helpline and an online reporting form. They do not ask for your personal information, and phone numbers/IP addresses

cannot be tracked.

Fearless (part of Crimestoppers)

This anonymous reporting service is specifically for 11–17-year-olds. The website also contains information about crime types, the bystander approach, and support services for young people.

Dress Code

We have high standards of dress code at St Wilfrid's Sixth Form. The dress code is based on smart, business like attire and students will be provided with a lanyard which MUST be worn at all times. We will do this to ensure that all our pupils take pride in their appearance. We wish our students to demonstrate their commitment to their education at St Wilfrid's by conforming and wearing the dress as prescribed in the policy.

If a student fails to adhere to this dress code then by the school or sent home in order to change their attire to something which is more appropriate, before returning to their studies.

Year 12 End of Year Exams

Students in Year 12 will sit assessments in their subjects in formal exam conditions, $3^{rd} - 10^{th}$ *June*. These internally assessed end of year assessments will take place alongside the externally assessed examinations that students have already received their timetables for.

We ask students to follow the same routines and procedures as they will follow for their external exams to prepare them for the unique challenges and demands around terminal exams.

All assessments will be used as a measure to inform student progress and all students will receive bespoke repair work following the assessments. The results of these assessments will also help us to form a picture of their predicted final grades for their UCAS and apprenticeship, applications and references. We ask students to prepare for each assessment thoroughly using resources provided from their subject staff.

We appreciate that students will want to do their best in the assessments, and they may feel a heightened sense of pressure to succeed, which is absolutely normal around this time. As a school we continue to put strategies in place to support our students to prepare for the assessment period, both academically and emotionally. An exam timetable will be provided to students in advance, with a copy available on the school website.

This week, 15 of our Year 12 students successfully completed their Gold Duke of Edinburgh practise expedition. We are immensely proud of the dedication and team work you have shown to get this far in your award. Well done!
