

HISTORY	SUPERPOWER RELATIONS AND THE COLD WAR, 1941-1991.	
Geography	RURAL AND URBAN LINKS (GCSE EDUQAS A) PUPILS WILL DEVELOP THEIR UNDERSTANDING OF UK PLACES AND THE CONTINUUM ON WHICH THEY SIT. THEY WILL EVALUATE THE CHANGES IN RURAL AND URBAN AREAS OF THE UK AND ASSESS THEIR IMPLICATIONS FOR THE FUTURE. THE MODULE OFFERS THE PUPILS A SIGHT INTO THE GLOBAL WORLD OF URBANISATION AND ALLOWS THEM TO INVESTIGATE TWO GLOBAL CITIES AT DIFFERENT STAGES OF ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AND UNDERSTAND THE CAUSES, EFFECTS AND MANAGEMENT STRATEGIES THAT EACH OF THESE CITIES CONTENDS WITH.

## **CURRICULUM OVERVIEW**

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY (ICT)	Cambridge Nationals iMedia. pupils are covering the theory unit R093 (Creative iMedia in Industry) learning and applying skills for R097 course work unit (Interactive Digital Media).	
Computer Science	GCSE IN COMPUTER SCIENCE IS ENGAGING AND PRACTICAL, ENCOURAGING CREATIVITY AND PROBLEM SOLVING. IT ENCOURAGES PUPILS TO DEVELOP THEIR UNDERSTANDING AND APPLICATION OF THE CORE CONCEPTS IN COMPUTER SCIENCE. PUPILS ALSO ANALYSE PROBLEMS IN COMPUTATIONAL TERMS AND DEVISE CREATIVE SOLUTIONS BY DESIGNING, WRITING, TESTING AND EVALUATING PROGRAMS.	
Engineering Manufacture	RO16: MANUFACTURING IN QUANTITY (COURSEWORK, 30% OF OVERALL GRADE). STUDENT INTERPRET A GIVEN ENGINEERING DRAWING OF A PART AND RECREATE IT USING 2D COMPUTER AIDED DESIGN (CAD) SOFTWARE. THEY MANUFACTURE A TEMPLATE BEFORE PRODUCING A DETAILED STANDARD OPERATING PROCEDURE TO MANUFACTURE THE PART USING A LASER CUTTER (CAM). THE PART IS THEN CHECKED AGAINST QUALITY CONTROL PROCEDURE.	
Design and Technology	Unit 2 (coursework, 50% of overall grade). pupils have responded to a design context in Year 10 and are now producing initial design ideas. They will develop these ideas using presentation techniques, 2D and 3D modelling (including CAD) and begin planning the manufacture of a one-off prototype.	
PHYSICAL EDUCATION	PUPILS WILL FOCUS ON 'ORIGINALITY.' PUPILS WILL DEMONSTRATE CREATIVITY TO APPLY TECHNIQUES AND TACTICS IN GAME SITUATIONS TO OVERCOME OPPONENTS. PUPILS PARTICIPATE IN A RANGE OF SPORTS OF THEIR CHOICE THROUGHOUT YEAR 11, IN ORDER FOR PUPILS TO EXPLORE A RANGE OF ACTIVITIES TO INFORM THEIR LIFELONG PARTICIPATION CHOICES. IN THESE SPORTS, PUPILS AIM TO USE THE SKILLS THEY HAVE ACQUIRED, REFINED AND DEVELOPED IN KEY STAGE 3, TO CREATIVELY ADAPT THEM TO GAME SITUATIONS TO OVERCOME OPPONENTS USING ORIGINALITY.	
BUSINESS STUDIES	Theme 2 Building A Business: pupils look at ways in which businesses can grow and examine how their aims and objectives change as businesses evolve. pupils investigate how globalisation impacts a business and look at environmental considerations on a business. pupils then learn about the marketing mix and consider key operational decision making within a growing business.	
TRAVEL AND TOURISM	Component 3 Influences on Travel and Tourism Organisation: pupils investigate a wide range of factors including political, economic, health and media influences. They examine how tourism organisations are impacted by these factors. pupils begin to practice examination technique to prepare them for the final summer examination.	
Photography	Mock Exam – pupils will be given a previous exam paper. They will explore a theme, photographers and concepts. pupils will experiment with materials and respond to artists in order to create a final piece.	
Art	Mock Exam – pupils will be given a previous exam paper. They will explore a theme, artists and concepts. pupils will experiment with materials and respond to artists in order to create a final piece. Exam – pupils will use the same concept as the Mock Exam to sit their final exam.	
Health and Social Care	Component 2 – pupils will learn about the range of health and social care services (primary, secondary, tertiary), any barriers individuals face accessing them and how they can be overcome. pupils will also learn the essential skills, attributes and values required to provide effective care.




